Non-specific urethritis in Ireland, 2018

Key Facts

- In 2018, 518 cases (10.9 per 100,000 population) of non-specific urethritis (NSU) were notified in Ireland
- NSU data were underreported in the second half of 2018; therefore the trends in the number and rate of cases should be interpreted with caution

Introduction

Non-specific urethritis (NSU), also known as non-gonococcal urethritis (NGU), occurs in individuals who have urethral inflammation that is not the result of infection with *Neisseria gonorrhoeae*. NSU can have a number of causes, including irritation to the urethra by soaps, creams or an object, or sexually transmitted infections (STIs).

Where caused by STIs, the most common organisms implicated are *Chlamydia trachomatis* and *Mycoplasma genitalium* [1]. It's estimated that chlamydia is responsible for nearly half of all male cases of NSU [2]. Chlamydia is a notifiable disease in Ireland, and cases are generally notified separately as chlamydia rather than as NSU. Reports on chlamydia are available at <u>http://www.hpsc.ie/a-</u>

M. genitalium infection is not currently a notifiable disease in Ireland and is not reported separately to NSU.

NSU is notifiable under the Infectious Disease Regulations in Ireland [3]. Notifications from STI clinics and primary care are collated by Departments of Public Health and notified to the Health Protection Surveillance Centre (HPSC). Data are notified as total numbers of NSU by quarter, with breakdown to clinic level available for some, but not all, HSE areas.

Data completeness

Data completeness is presented in Table 1. NSU data for 2018 could not be provided for three STI clinics in HSE East and for all STI clinics in HSE West; it is unlikely that these data will be reported as the pattern of missing data is unchanged since 2013. For the second half of 2018, NSU data could not be provided for one additional STI clinic in HSE East, and for all STI services in HSE Midwest; trends should be interpreted with caution due to this underreporting.

Epidemiology

There were 518 cases of NSU notified in Ireland in 2018, a 20% decrease compared to 2017 when 652 cases were notified (Figure 1). The notification rate (NR) in 2018 was 10.9 per 100,000 population. Interpretation of trends is difficult due to increased underreporting of cases in the second half of 2018, and given the absence of information on the causes of NSU.





Technical notes

- 1. Data for this report were provided in aggregate format by Departments of Public Health, further detail on completeness of data is provided in Table 1.
- 2. Aggregate data were collated on 28 June 2019, and were correct at the time of publication. Data may be updated in future reports.
- 3. Notification rates were calculated using population data from Census 2016.
