Advice for ground staff if suspect VHF case presents at airport

What to do if you come in contact with a suspected case of Viral Haemorrhagic Fever (VHF)? Ask the following questions:

- Has the person arrived from a VHF affected country? Or
- Spent any time in these countries within the past 21 days?

If **NO**, continue as normal



If YES

Does the person appear unwell? Signs and Symptoms to look out for include:

Fever (e.g. pale skin, sweating, shivering), diarrhoea, vomiting, weakness, muscle and joint pains and headaches.



If NO, then you are NOT at risk of contracting VHF.
VHF are only contagious if the infected person has symptoms of infection.



If YES

- Talk—Don't touch. Maintain a distance of at least 3 feet from the person (unless the person is vomiting—then maintain a distance of 7-10 feet)
- Isolate the person (e.g. Move the person into a side room, ideally with a telephone to enable telephone assistance if necessary and a toilet)
- 3. Call an ambulance. Tell them that the ill person has recently returned from a VHF-affected area.
- Hand-washing with soap and water is an important method for protecting yourself and your community from the spread of VHF.
