



Health security

- "Activities required, both proactive and reactive, to minimize the danger and impact of acute public health events that endanger people's health across geographical regions and international boundaries' (WHO)
- Prevention, preparedness, and response planningessential elements for effective monitoring, early warning of and combatting serious cross-border threats to health*.
- Preparedness is integral to EU health security framework*.

Legal basis/mandate: EU Regulation 2022/2371 on serious cross-border threats to health, Article 11 (Training of healthcare staff and public health staff)



- Expectations around preparedness, capability and capacity building for health security are growing in Europe
- The health security agenda continues to evolve and requires a cross-government approach, strong research and policy support.
- The cost of inaction and insufficient preparedness far outstrips the cost of effective, systematic and coordinated investment in preparedness and planning*
- WHO 2022: "Simply put, investments in preparedness facilitated by sizeable, consistent, and predictable public sector-led spending are essential to improving and protecting people's health, community well-being, and economies." **
